

# 41st Season includes Music for Queen Ann's Revenge!

Not many facts are known about Edward Teach who would become the infamous pirate Blackbeard. He is thought to have been born in Bristol, England but chose a life at sea. His infamy is based on only a few years of his life. The stories seem to have grown af-



ter his death which was in 1718.

Our program begins with music around the time of Blackbeard's birth. The program contains a number of works by Henry Purcell, the composer whose legacy is a unique English form of Baroque music. He is considered one of the greatest English composers ever. No nativeborn English composer approached his fame

until the 19<sup>th</sup> century or possibly even the 20th century with Benjamin Britten. We also include vocal and instrumental works of J.C. Pepusch, a German-born composer who settled in England about 1700 where, in 1710, he helped found the Academy of Vocal Music. He is known to have worked with Handel but is better known for his arrangement of the music for The Beggar's Opera (1728) to the libretto of John Gay. A contemporary of this time was Turlough O'Carolan, the blind Irish harper who composed and traveled Ireland for forty-five years. We included several of his compositions.

#### We continue to highlight aspects of Blackbeard's life. He's called to 'adventures' on the ocean. This section features diversity with a text dear to sailors and is often sung at blessings of ships. 'Salve Regina' is a prayer to the Blessed Virgin Mary asking her to be merciful to us, be our advocate and show us Jesus. Featured also are two short selections called Koromanti in writings of Sir Hans Sloane, the British physician who traveled to Jamaica in 1687 to catalog plant and animal life in the New World. Jamaica became home base for many pirates. The program also includes dances as might have been played onboard including tunes from Playford.

In an attempt to end piracy Blackbeard and another pirate, Stede Bonnet, received king's pardons by the Governor of North Carolina who hoped the pirates would change their ways. Governor Eden even officiated at a wedding for Blackbeard and his bride. We perform love songs. But, being an upstanding citizen doesn't seem to fit and shortly we find Blackbeard back at sea. The music switches to that of a kind of sadness and deception. The calling of the sea is greater than that of the land.

Do we not all have a yearning for some kind of adventure?

We close the program with a selection of unknown origin from the Caribbean. A lot of audience members will recognize the song and we end with a sing-a-long of the refrain. *Karen Wite Jacob*

### Christmas at St. Mary's has special music connection from 1582

In 1582, Theodoricus Petri, a Finnish student at the university in Rostock, compiled a song book with 74 Latin church and school songs, intending to preserve some ancient hymns and songs of his fatherland. The rector of the Turku Cathedral School, Jaakko Finne (or Suomalainen) edited and published the first edition of Piae Cantiones in Greifswald, (present day northeast Germany). The collection became one of Finland's greatest musical treasures, and demonstrated Finland's link to other medieval European cultural centers. A few works on our program come in some way from this source. "Personent Hodie" dates to 1360 as found in the Mosberg manuscript, now in the Statsbibliothek in Munich. Of interest is the use of the tune for "Corde natus" which appears with the text Divi*num mysterium* (in praise of the Blessed Sacrament) in Piae Cantiones. The "Corde natus" text by the Romano-Spanish poet Prudentius was incorporated into Spanish and other European Rites to be sung at Marian Feasts. The English hymn writer J.M. Neale combined these words with the tune. In 1853, G. J. R. Gordon, Her Majesty's Envoy and Minister at Stockholm, gave him a rare and possibly unique copy of the Piae Cantiones 1582 edition.

Many of these tunes would not be known to us today if it weren't for the Reverend Mr. Neale.
